

EASTON LEGION CORPS IS NOW 'CITY'S OWN'

Formally Adopted and Presented With Municipal Flags

The trumpet and drum corps of the Brown and Lynch Post, No. 9, American Legion, Easton, was adopted as Easton's official musical organization and was presented with the city's flags by Mayor Horn at a reception and dinner given by the citizens last evening in the Hotel Easton.

Eighty of the leading citizens of the city participated in the event, which opened with a review and parade. Prior to gathering at the hotel, the citizens lined up on North Second street near the Wolf Junior High school, as the corps passed in review. Then all paraded to the hotel.

Attorney Asher Seip was the toastmaster of the occasion. Rev. L. V. Hetrick offered the invocation and addresses were given by Mayor Horn and Wesley M. Heiberger, former mayor of Easton. The latter told of what the Legion post had accomplished for the city since the World War.

Mayor Horn officially designated the Legion trumpet and drum corps as the "city's own," and then presented the city flags. The corps paraded the colors through the dining room while the gathering stood at salute.

Three musical numbers, "Spirit of Columbia's Sons," "Somewhere in France" and "Comrades of World's Freedom," all composed and arranged by Charles W. Neumoyer, commander of the corps, were included in the program given by the band. The Legion double quartet also pleased with several selections.

The citizens committee which arranged for last night affair was composed of Messrs. Albert M. Pepper, Edward G. Aicher, Asher Seip, George Hellick, James L. Evans, Herbert E. Sandt and Asher L. Odenwelder.
